On Saturday, the fourth of November, a group of six met in the sanctuary to hang the Stars of Remembrance for the next day's celebration of All Saint's Day. Bill Lindig had gotten the box of supplies out of a cabinet where it was kept. Can you believe that that involved removing the cabinet doors to make it possible for the box to be removed?

Marion had the honor of bringing the supplies into the sanctuary. Then Annie Pitschka opened the box and the fun began. Highly organized, lines, for hanging the stars had been carefully wrapped around heavy cardboard tubes. The tubes had code letters on them indicating where that group of stars was to be hung. Pastor Steve was on one ladder, Bill on another. Jeff Niederloh and Dan Mast were on the pews. Being tall was a definite advantage. Kaye Lindig had a yardstick with which she nudged the stars to more precise locations. Even short Marion was useful in picking up used pieces of tape, bulldog clips, used plastic straws, and tissue paper wads, disposing of some, and sorting the other stuff into organized piles.

The job was quickly done. Everyone had done the work before. But what is going to happen in the future when, as one person mentioned, "I'm getting too old for this." (It wasn't Marion.) We need younger people to come forward and work with the experienced workers to learn how it is done. What cabinet is used to store the stars? What do those code words mean? Is there a specific order the lines of stars need to go up? Some lines are longer than others? Why?

GETTING TO KNOW...

Here it is, the last month of the year, and we are going back to something we did in the past. We are re-introducing "Getting to Know..." In the past we had articles on members of our congregation so we could know them better. We decided to go to the church's birthday list for December and find the oldest member on it.

Hey, everyone, meet Phyllis Benson! On Dec. 9th she will be 94 years old.

I met will Phyllis and her husband Jerry, one afternoon and had the most delightful time. Both of them have such a happy outlook on life, and quick senses of humor, and a firm belief in their Lord.

Phyllis was born in Iowa. There was a midwife handling the birth and that midwife was Phyllis' grandmother!

Phyllis' early days were quite unstable. Her father worked for the railroad which meant the family moved multiple times. One year she went to three different schools. The rail company provided housing for the family. Their house was two box cars set side by side! Like many other siblings at the time, Phyllis and her sister shared a bed. The house had no electricity, plumbing, or telephone.

After graduating from high school, she landed a job within two days in Omaha, NE where the family was then living. She has worked in several occupations even after she married and had a son. (She later divorced.)

Jerry entered the picture and he knew from the first moment that he was going to marry Phyllis. He adored her and her son. Their courtship was unusual in that they never went on a date. Whenever they were together it was always at some social function with others around. Their first real date was on New Year's Eve. He proposed right then and there.

The two married July 16, 1960, and moved into an apartment that Phyllis called "the gopher hole". Housing improved over the years complete with multiple bedrooms and modern conveniences. Phyllis loved house-keeping and is upset now that someone comes to their apartment each week to dust and vacuum for her!

Luke 2:8-12

And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks by night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths lying in a manger."



DID YOU KNOW?

In the King James Version of the Christmas story, most of us have learned that the term "swaddling clothes" in not a good translation. The more accurate term is "swaddling cloths". Remember how the announcing angel told the shepherds out there in the fields that they should go to Bethlehem and find the Babe wrapped in swaddling cloths (or "bands") lying in a manger? Shepherds were very familiar with that term as well as the word "manger." They knew exactly what they should look for.

So, what exactly were the swaddling cloths? They were strips of fabric five inches wide by five to six yards long! That's 180-216 inches! How were they used? When lambs are born they could injure themselves. Apparently lambs struggle to "find their feet" during their first hours after birth. If these lambs were to be sacrificed later, they had to be perfect, no scrapes or scars allowed. Many of the lambs used in the temple sacrifices in Jerusalem were born and raised in Bethlehem. When the shepherds entered the cave (not stable) they would immediately recognize the Baby the angel had told them about because they saw the feeding trough and the cloths.

I have some of my own thought about those swaddling cloths. Changing a baby's swaddling cloths must have been a challenge when they had been dirtied. Mom's at that time must have had some method no longer remembered how to make it easier.

And those poor little lambs must have looked somewhat like Charlie Brown in his winter snow clothes. How could they possibly have moved? It would be interesting to have some present day shepherd experiment with those cloths and make a video of the little lamb fully swaddled.

Swaddling cloths also were used when a person died. The corpse was wrapped in those long strips of fabric. What a picture. When Jesus' life came to an end, He was wrapped just as He had been wrapped 33 years before.

I found much of this information in a book entitled *The Forgotten Jesus* by Robby Callaty.
